


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




Foreword






The Ag. Club this year has had but very little chance to do much work on account of the shortened school year. For what they have done, they have been under the leadership of La Ville Merrill, who was secretary last year and who has acted as executive this year, although no elections were held. Most of the experimental work has been done by members of the agriculture and animal husbandry classes with Mr. Kirkbride as overseer. As provided by the Smith-Hughes bill these two classes ended April 11 as far as class work was concerned, but in order to get full credit, the students have to carry on an experiment throughout the summer. In agriculture this consists of raising some crop and in animal husbandry, the keeping of the milk record of a cow, is the work required. The Smith-Hughes work has become a permanent thing in the agricultural line at our school and students are bound to get much more good out of it than they would out of classroom work alone.
