Band students consistently test higher in reading and math and gain immense satisfaction and confidence from learning a new skill, performing in front of audiences, and working as a team. Band is more than a class. We're a team! Do NOT miss this opportunity for your child to take BAND!

What are the instruments?

How much does band cost?

The first concern of most parents is the cost of participating in band. We offer different solutions to make band affordable for every student. I work very hard to make sure that cost is never a reason for a student to not be in band. Here are your options:

Option 1: Purchase an instrument (new or used) from a reputable music store. Most stores offer affordable *rent-to-own* options for as little as \$15-25 per month. This is probably the best option because you are most likely to get a quality instrument. Also, students who work to earn part of the money for an instrument are more committed, practice more, and tend to stick with it longer.


Do NOT buy an instrument from ebay or amazon.com or from a big box retailer like WalMart. Do NOT buy an instrument that is a *non-traditional color*, like blue or pink. These will for sure be terrible brands and will have problems that will frustrate your child. Good deals on good brands *can* be found on ksl.com classifieds if you can find an instrument locally that you can look at in person. Please call me first to discuss brands and if it's a good deal or not.

Option 2: Use an instrument your family already owns. Neighbors or friends who have had kids in band in the past may also be interested in loaning or selling their instrument. Ask around on *Facebook*. Old instruments often have issues that make it difficult for your child to play. Please take your old instrument to The Book Table or Trevor Teuscher (435-770-5586), or any other business that cleans and repairs instruments before school starts.

Option 3: Rent an instrument from the school -- \$100 for the school year. This option exists for the following large or expensive instruments: oboe, bassoon, euphonium, trombone, or tuba. The school does have *all* the band instruments to rent, like flutes, clarinets, and trumpets, but these come on a "first-to-call-and-ask-me-basis," and fee-waiver kids get first priority. Please call or text me ASAP about this option if money is a concern and I'll make it work. Again, money should *never* get in the way of your child participating in band. Please *call me* to discuss this option and I'll make it work. If your child is unsure about band, perhaps renting from the school is a good option to give it a try without committing too much money at first.

How and when do students sign up? When you come to the school for 7th grade registration you will mark one of the three band classes, depending on the instrument you choose: woodwinds, brass, or percussion.

Where's the best place to get an instrument? The following businesses offer great new or used purchase prices or *rent-to-own* options. Shop around for the best deals. KSL.com classifieds are also a good place to look.
